>To Make Snow Painting Spray Bottles: Fill your spray bottles with water. Then add 4-5 drops of concentrated food coloring to each bottle. Shake the bottle to mix the food coloring with the water. You may need more or less depending on the size of the bottle and how much water you use. It should be concentrated which will give you a more vibrant color when spraying. If you find the color is coming out a little dull, just add another drop into your bottle. The color in the bottle should be a dark color. If it looks a little light, then you may want to add more food coloring in.

>To Make Snow Cream: Mix 8 cups clean, fresh snow, 1, 14 oz can of sweetened condensed milk, and 1 T. of vanilla extract together in a bowl until well mixed.

>To Make A Suet Ball: Mix together in a large bowl

1 cup melted beef suet (available from the meat counter upon request or find lard at the grocery store)

1 cup peanut butter (crunchy or plain)

1 cup rolled oats (regular oatmeal)

1 cup cornmeal

1 cup mixed wild bird seed

Form the mixture in a ball and put in netting (found at fabric stores). You can also save a bag that oranges/onions come in and use that. Hang it outside where birds can get to it.
